There is an ideal, I think, that motivated most of us who served after 9/11 – some reason that justified the unrecoverable currency of youth we **voluntarily** spent in Iraq, Afghanistan and other places.

Nolan Peterson writes that <u>U.S. troops, sailors, airmen and Marines are still</u> <u>conducting combat operations against Islamist militant groups</u> in Iraq and Afghanistan, as well as in other theaters such as Syria and Libya, across Africa and in the Philippines.

All of us who served have friends or acquaintances who died in combat.

This might sound dark or off-putting to those <u>who have never been in combat</u> or sent a loved one off to war, but when I hugged my brother goodbye before each of his deployments to Afghanistan, I found myself purposefully emblazoning the moment in my mind, worrying it could be the last time I would ever see him.

Former Army Sergeant 1st Class Jeffrey Martin, <u>a veteran of six combat</u> <u>deployments</u>, including Desert Storm and the 2003 invasion of Iraq, said it well: "When the bullets are flying and shit starts blowing up, you're not thinking about any of that duty, honor, country bullshit.

Some 214 million people are <u>international *migrants*</u>, living in a different country from the one in which they were born.

In the UK, <u>38% of *immigrants* have a degree level qualification</u>, compared with 18% of the UK-born population, according to The Work Foundation.

On the face of it, that looks like a bad thing for the developing nation they have come from, especially if it has paid for <u>the skilled *emigrant's* education</u>.

This is what Australia says on an official website about the points system that it uses in <u>assessing *would-be immigrants*</u>: "The points test is a transparent and objective method of selecting skilled migrants with the skills and attributes needed in Australia."

It also shows some *well-trodden migration routes* used by skilled workers.

*applying for/ granting permanent residence

The Financial Times says the Home Office is holding secret trials of an online system aimed at speeding up **permanent residence applications** from thousands of EU citizens looking to secure their UK immigration status in the run-up to Brexit.

<u>Curt von Badinski</u>, a mechanical engineer and co-founder of a San Franciscobased tech company, <u>has a six-hour daily commute from Los Angeles</u> – most of it by plane.

Five days a week, he rises at 05:00 for <u>the 15-minute drive to Bob Hope</u> <u>Burbank airport</u>, for <u>a 90-minute flight to Oakland</u>, located 353 miles (568km) north west.

"The way <u>I justify a six-hour commute</u> is having the ability to have all the things that I want," he explains.

The trade-off: <u>a 55-mile drive to the office</u> that sometimes left her <u>commuting</u> by car up to four hours a day.

I think many of us feel <u>this overwhelming sense of powerlessness on **commutes** because we get stuck on a train or in a traffic jam and there is nothing we can do about it."</u>

Someone who commutes for 15 hours each week misses out on about half an hour of sleep each day.

Of course, there's an underlying problem <u>that keeps us from taking in the</u> benefits of commuting.

Could it be that we aren't utilising our commute time in the way we should?

Essentially, people who have higher levels of self-control might ask themselves a series of questions on <u>the morning commute</u>, such as: What do I need to do today?

Statistics Canada, for example, found <u>transit commutes in Canada to be 81%</u> <u>longer (41 extra minutes per day)</u> than those by car. Plus, there's the added stress of travelling with a group of people in crowded conditions.

* jet lag / time zone - constructions

<u>Jet lag</u>, a confusion between the internal body clock and the external environmental time, is often one of the most unpleasant parts of travel.

"We as humans were never expected to <u>travel at speed across time lines</u> so quickly; when <u>you go beyond three time lines</u> you can start <u>getting jet lag</u>," said Dr Guy Meadows, who runs *the Sleep School* in London and is author of *The Sleep Book*.

Warding off jet lag

"Remember <u>few people have ever died of **jet lag**</u>," he added, but long flights can take their toll in other ways.

BBC Capital quizzed frequent business fliers for their best tips and tricks to beat **jet lag** and arrive five time zones away ready for the next meeting.

<u>To get through **time zone** trauma</u>, Cowie has two key tricks — and one of them involves working less.

In general, it takes about one day <u>to get over each hour of **time difference** from your home country</u>, Dr Meadows said. One way <u>to cut back on that **time zone**</u> malaise?

Dr Meadows recommends the power nap to combat **jet lag**. "<u>The pressures of</u> your old **time zone** bearing down on you can be sickening. Have a 10 to 30 minute power nap."

Some experienced travellers say it's better to keep pace with your home time **zone**. "I always keep my watch and body clock at the time of my home [London] so that <u>I don't lose perspective of time zones</u>. This is really important as the majority of my work is in London, hence <u>I need to stick to that time zone</u>," El Imad said.

Major Hong Kong street to go **car free** this weekend – but city 'lagging behind' New York and London.

Planned closure of Des Voeux Road in Central hailed as <u>breakthrough for car-</u> <u>free events</u>, but experts say it is just a "small step" towards much-needed greater pedestrianisation. The road will be temporarily closed to traffic on Sunday between Pedder Street and Morrison Street, in what campaigners have hailed as <u>a significant breakthrough</u> for **car-free events** in Hong Kong.

He said he hoped transport chiefs would begin to seriously consider proposals to make other parts of the city permanently pedestrianised while <u>his group starts</u> planning similar **car-free days** for next year.

But Fung said he wanted to see stronger connections between <u>car-free roads</u>, particularly between the east and west of Hong Kong Island.

Sunday's event will be held just a few days after <u>World Car Free Day was</u> <u>celebrated</u> across the globe on Thursday.

In London, pedestrianisation schemes have increasingly garnered support from politicians, road users and business owners, with the city's main shopping hub, Oxford Street, <u>due to become **car free** by 2020</u>.

Hong Kong currently has seven full-time pedestrian schemes, 30 part-time pedestrian schemes and more than <u>40 traffic calming schemes</u>.

SPEAKING / WRITING ABOUT BIAS & DISCRIMINATION

* bias-construction

Similar studies in the US, UK, Australia and France uncovered <u>racial bias among</u> <u>CV screeners toward ethnic minorities</u>.

A randomised field experiment conducted in Chicago and Paris that compared call-back rates of foreign-sounding names and <u>Anglo-Saxon names encountered</u> <u>similar labour-market bias</u>.

In a 2016 study conducted jointly by the University of Toronto and *Administrative Science Quarterly*, a Cornell University journal, 40% of minority job applicants admitted to "whitening" their CVs **to counter racial bias** in the hiring process.

Research done by Dr Mahzarin Banaji, professor of social ethics at Harvard University, corroborates that we are wired **to be biased in favour of** those who are like us. Banaji, who co-authored *Blindspot: <u>Hidden Biases</u> of Good People*, argues

that despite claims of being open-minded, most people prefer those with similar education or ethnic backgrounds and experiences.

So we bring this unconscious bias to everything we do.

* discrimination-construction

New Zealand-based Paul Spoonley, a researcher at Massey University, says <u>there</u> is significant name and accent **discrimination exhibited** by employers in New Zealand that can be tied to assumptions around ethnicity.

Conrad Braithwaite, funder of *UK Deed Poll*, a company that helps people legally change their name, says each year thousands of UK residents Anglicise or adopt new names. A significant number of these are by ethnic minorities trying to escape discrimination in the job market, he says.

Around the world research and anecdotal evidence shows job applicants from racial minorities have **responded** in similar way **to recruitment discrimination** due to their ethnic identities.

"The results support the idea that <u>discrimination arises</u> [because] birds of a feather flock together," he says.
