1. Speaking/writing about animal abuse in general

*animal abuse/cruelty – constructions

There was outrage when the abuse to which Andrew and Daniel Frankish subjected a bulldog became public knowledge.

<u>Others held a vigil for the</u> **abused dog** while a plane was flown over Middlesbrough FC's stadium during a match, calling for the brothers to be locked up.

"If we do not properly punish these people then <u>as a society we are essentially</u> <u>legitimising **abuse against animals**".</u>

The charity says <u>professionals</u> "can no longer afford to ignore the potential links between <u>child abuse</u> and <u>animal cruelty</u>.

The two **forms of abuse** should not be seen as mutually exclusive; it needs to be recognised that they can co-exist, or there may be associations between the two".

League Against Cruel Sports chief executive Eduardo Goncalves added: "If we don't offer a serious punishment to animal abusers then they will continue **abusing animals**.

Are we tough enough on animal cruelty?

*types of animal abuse – constructions

When <u>two brothers</u> who <u>filmed themselves</u> <u>torturing a dog</u> were spared jail it provoked an outcry.

"Six months in prison for the gravest act of animal cruelty, such as **torturing an animal to death**, is a fraction of the maximum sentence for fly tipping [five years] or theft [seven years]," she said.

<u>The brothers, from Redcar in Teesside, had</u> <u>repeatedly stamped on the dog</u> and <u>thrown it down stairs</u>.

She reiterated her stance when <u>another pair of her constituents admitted</u> <u>hammering a nail into a dog's head</u> and burying it alive in what a court heard was "the worst case" a vet had ever seen.

In December <u>Christopher and Adam Hoar were jailed</u> for six weeks for **kicking a** <u>hedgehog to death</u> at Dalton Park retail centre in Murton, County Durham.

Jennifer Lampe received a four-month suspended sentence in August after <u>she</u> <u>drunkenly **decapitated her two snakes** with scissors before **swallowing their heads** <u>at her home</u> in Market Drayton, Shropshire.</u>

There have been five prosecutions relating to the "Neknomination" online craze in which <u>people took part in "dares" involving</u> **swallowing live fish, frogs and even** <u>a lizard.</u>

Kieran Milledge was jailed for 21 weeks in November after he swung his Staffordshire bull terrier, Ronnie, against a train's wall and pushed his foot in the dog's face.

John Wilcock and Bernadette Nunney were given suspended sentences and banned from keeping animals for life in November for **leaving dozens of dogs in squalid conditions** at a farm in Bradford, West Yorkshire.

Gary Samuel from Enfield was given a suspended 12-week prison sentence in March 2016 after <u>police</u> found dogs locked in cages in a filthy "pitch-black <u>dungeon</u>" at

Armley Vets in Leeds, West Yorkshire.

In Gloucestershire <u>a man was jailed for 16 weeks for **microwaving a rabbit to** <u>**death**</u> because he "was angry".</u>

The RSPCA has highlighted several "shocking" cases, including that of <u>a man</u> who **stabbed** his **dog** and then **hid** her **behind the washing machine.**

2. Speaking/writing about animal cruelty offenders

***abuser** – constructions

There is a substantial body of evidence that <u>animal cruelty offenders also</u> <u>commit other serious crimes.</u>

A study carried out on behalf of the NSPCC found <u>the children of **pet abusers**</u> were more at risk of neglect or abuse themselves.

"If <u>we don't offer a serious punishment to **animal abusers** then they will continue abusing animals.</u>

Now an <u>MP is hoping to make the law tougher on **perpetrators**.</u>

"They often mean the **perpetrators** of cruel acts towards animals just receive a <u>slap on the wrist</u>."

I know in the back of my mind that if <u>we catch a **dog fighter**</u>, the most they will get is six months in prison – and probably much less.

3. Speaking/writing about reaction to animal abuse.

***public reaction** – constructions

When two brothers who filmed themselves torturing a dog were spared jail \underline{it} provoked an outcry.

The sentence attracted widespread criticism.

***actions against animal cruelty – constructions**

The RSPCA said <u>it would</u> "deter people from abusing and neglecting <u>animals</u>".

The new legislation will also enable <u>courts</u> to <u>deal more effectively with</u> <u>ruthless gangs</u> involved in organised dog fights, the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs said.

These plans will <u>give courts the tools</u> they have requested <u>to deal with the most</u> <u>abhorrent acts</u>," Mr Gove said.

4. Speaking/writing about punishment for animal abuse.

***penalty/punishment** – constructions

Nearly <u>500,000 people signed an online petition calling for a **tougher penalty**. "The **maximum penalty for** animal cruelty offences is under review."</u>

"The current <u>sentences available</u> to courts <u>to punish animal abuse</u> are not working," she says.

"If we do not **properly punish** these people then as a society we are essentially legitimising abuse against animals".

"So let's get this into proportion <u>and let</u> <u>the punishment for abusing animals</u> <u>truly fit the crime</u>."

League Against Cruel Sports chief executive Eduardo Goncalves added: "If <u>we</u> <u>don't</u> <u>offer a serious punishment to animal abusers</u> then they will continue abusing animals.

Under the government's plans, <u>courts will retain the ability</u> <u>to hand out an</u> <u>unlimited fine</u> and <u>ban an offender from owning animals</u> in the future.

The Scottish <u>government</u> said it had recently committed to <u>increasing the</u> <u>maximum</u> <u>penalty for the most serious</u> <u>animal cruelty cases</u> to five years' imprisonment.

The Department for Environment, Farming and Rural Affairs (Defra) said about 1,150 people per year <u>are convicted for animal cruelty</u> – but fewer than five receive the current maximum sentence.

<u>People</u> in England who commit the most serious crimes of animal cruelty <u>could</u> <u>face up to five years in prison</u>, the government has said.

"We are a nation of animal lovers and so we must ensure that <u>those</u> who commit the most shocking cruelty towards animals <u>face suitably tough punishments</u>."

"They often mean <u>the perpetrators of</u> <u>cruel acts towards animals</u> just receive a <u>slap on the wrist</u>.

England and Wales have the lightest maximum sentence in Europe for animal cruelty offences.

Between 2013 and 2015 more than 3,000 people in England and Wales were **convicted** of animal cruelty but just 7% received jail terms.

<u>Ms Turley's</u> <u>Animal Cruelty (Sentencing) Bill</u> – which will have its second reading on Friday – <u>would increase the maximum to five years</u>, matching the current situation in Northern Ireland.

<u>Claire Horton</u>, chief executive of Battersea Dogs' and Cats' Home, <u>said the</u> <u>sentences for animal cruelty were too gentle.</u>

"Six months in prison for the **gravest act of animal cruelty**, such as torturing an animal to death, is a fraction of the maximum sentence for fly tipping [five years] or theft [seven years]," she said.

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
